2025 WA Volunteer of the Year Awards

The Toodyay Agricultural Society (TAS) recently recommended long-time, now-retired Committee member, Alison Wroth, for Lifetime Contribution to Volunteering recognition in this year's WA Volunteer of the Year Awards.

This award honours those who have dedicated over 20 years to volunteering and made a lasting impact on the WA community. While we weren't fortunate enough to secure a nomination this time, we'd like to take a moment to congratulate the deserving nominees: Brother Olly Pickett AM from Wheelchairs for Kids (Perth), Colin Longworth from Living Proud (Bayswater), and Nicole Kelly from the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (Tom Price). Their dedication is truly inspiring.

We'd like to take this opportunity to share some of the insights we gathered while researching Alison's involvement, so the community can get a real sense of the positive impact she's had over the years and the difference she's made in our local area.

Alison Wroth, née Cook, has been a dedicated and active TAS member for an impressive 31 years, having joined the Committee in 1994. Over the years, Alison has taken on a range of key roles, including two terms as President (2012-2014 and 2020-2022), and serving as Chief Steward for 18 years. Her contributions have also extended to Publicity and Promotions, Entertainment, and being part of the Central Group, where she was actively involved in the annual RASWA Central Group Displays. As the Rural Ambassador Coordinator, Alison played an integral role in supporting the Society's outreach and engagement. Alison was also the last recipient of the Toodyay Miss Showgirl title in 1992 and became a Life Member in 2016, a testament to her dedication and passion for the Society's success.

In Alison's words "I have always helped at the Show since I was in Primary School as various family members; my Grandfather to my Mum were on the organising Committee. I have wonderful memories of the Busy Bees, setting up the Show, back in the years when the Committee needed no "outside" assistance as we do now. All manual work was done by the Committee to set up for the big day. My Mum, Lynn Cook, was Chief Steward or Hall Steward for many years, before the day of the online Showday Programme of course. Along with many other Section Stewards, when I was a teenager, I would help her prepare prize cards, transcribe entries from the Entry forms onto those historic red Section Steward Notebooks at home and I remember I came in handy when it came to cleaning the Lee Steere Exhibition Hall and the old Tearooms next door (now demolished)".



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KEY CONTRIBUTIONS & ACHIEVEMENTS

- 150th and 160th Anniversary celebrations and Shows, including the "Jazz Ball" and "Spring Ball" events
- 170th Anniversary celebrations, unfortunately not including the planned "Dance through the Decades"
- Renovation of the Terrace Bar in 2021
- Planning of the 170th Toodyay Show Anniversary Quilt
- Chief Steward role: Initiated Exhibitors Workshops to encourage community participation, Judges Workshops to improve presentation and preparation of entries
- Developed the TAS Tee Shirt and Jacket
- Introduced the Rusty Roll and "Guess the Weight of the Steer" competitions, initially sponsored by Alison's family, to engage visitors and encourage participation. The Rusty Roll competition is now also held as a Facebook contest.
- Created the "Man Cake" class in the Cooking Section of the Schedule with the slogan "Size does not matter," which has become a popular attraction for local men
- Spearheaded the development of the TAS website in 2014, a vital tool for promoting the Show and improving online engagement
- Managed maintenance of the Sheep Pavilion, painting of the Lee Steere Extension / benches, and renovation of the Poultry & Pigeon Shed in 2014 during her presidency
- Coordinated the Rural Ambassador competition, helping local youth connect with others from similar rural backgrounds and supporting their ambitions. Managed the competition between Northam, York, Beverley, and Toodyay Ag Societies, organizing judges, venues, catering, and prizes
- Advocated for the continuation of the competition, which is at risk of losing support from other societies
- Participated in the planning and fundraising for the Youth Hall, one of the Society's key buildings, which involved significant community effort and volunteer support

Alison's passion for and expertise in the field of agriculture doesn't just aid the Society in their annual show organising, it inspires a whole community (most of whom she knows as a true country girl, born and bred), ensuring agriculture remains front of mind, valued, respected and celebrated for generations to come. NOTABLE CHALLENGES & RESILIENCE

In Alison's words "The main challenge during the entire time I have been involved with the Show is the hard task to encourage the younger age groups to take an interest in the organisation of THEIR Show instead of running 100 miles at the word COMMITTEE! Times have definitely changed and we have to approach membership and leadership in a different way. Succession Plans are absolutely necessary to provide support and stability to an organisation.

Being President and losing much loved committee member Gaven Donegan so suddenly and getting TAS through his death and funeral just before the Decennial Ball and Annual Show was a huge personal challenge.

Cancelling the 2020 Show, a huge decision, but in a way coping with that and organising a Quiz Night to fundraise and provide a night of enjoyment on what would have been the Show, was a good way of handling 2020.

Over the years all the extra effort and time spent was for a worthy cause...the Toodyay Show, full stop. I don't look at anything regarding the Show as a sacrifice; even though more time to spend with my family instead of "doing Ag business" would have been appreciated".

Alison was a fantastic teacher and mentor, she constantly reached out to the Agricultural members and residents of Toodyay, encouraging them to join the team or in some small way contribute to ensure her beloved show was a huge success. Her knowledge of Toodyay, the History of the Toodyay Agricultural Show and Historical Toodyay Show grounds were so important to her. Alison's reward was watching the joy on patrons faces on show day each October, hearing the laughter of the Children and always ending the show with the fireworks.

Kristee Jolly: Alison Wroth's dedication to the Toodyay Agricultural Society and the broader community is worthy nomination for the Lifetime Contribution to Volunteering Award. Alison was the one who encouraged me to join the TAS committee, as she recognised the importance of including young voices in decision-making. Her passion for ensuring that Toodyay's youth felt valued and involved was evident in everything interaction I had with her. Alison didn't just keep TAS traditions alive—she actively worked to inspire the next generation of volunteers and invited young volunteers like me to contribute new ideas and start new traditions. Her deep love for the Toodyay community has left a lasting impact, and I feel incredibly fortunate to have worked alongside her. Toodyay is a better, more connected place because of Alison, and I can't think of anyone more deserving of this recognition.
